Greetings from the Faculty Association.

Here are a few items to keep on your radar screens for the near future. First, bargaining is just getting underway at the state level. The MSCA is optimistic it can further refine elements of the contract that do not serve faculty well and that we can again secure salary increases. It is unclear what posture the Patrick administration will take in light of the fact that Deval may have his eyes on another political prize at the national level.

Second, the Executive Committee will look to schedule 3-4 open meetings with the administration (including Mary) that focus on issues that faculty deem to be important. Mary has also asked that some the time be used to update faculty on the frenzied political and policy climates.

Third, if you are teaching in an on-line format, or planning to in the future, you should probably attend the February 12 (1:00 in Sullivan) discussion about online pedagogy, training, etc. The administration is looking to require some type of certification process for faculty who teach on-line to assure a quality experience for students.

Finally, this will be my last semester as Faculty Association President and parttime Grievance Officer. These positions will need to filled at our May elections. If you have any interest, contact me and I can go over some of the responsibilities and compensation options. I understand that many of us are hurried and/or overworked at the moment, but we need someone who can continue to work with the administration in several areas, including conflict resolution.

Mass. House bill would benefit adjuncts

The plight of adjuncts can change, if House Bill H1086 can get out of committee.

The bill supports the option for adjunct faculty members to get health insurance, to gain seniority, to be included and gain priority in hiring when full-time jobs become available, improved pay, AND a requirement that significantly more hires be full-time.

All of these are important provisions. We all know critical and highly qualified part-time teachers who've been incredible supportive of the college and who deserve a great deal more fair treatment than current contracts allow.

Sending letters, emails, and calls to our many representatives on the Joint Committee for Higher Education could be very helpful.
