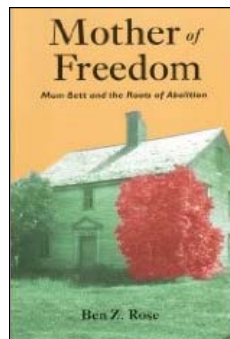

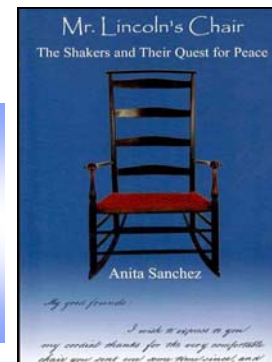

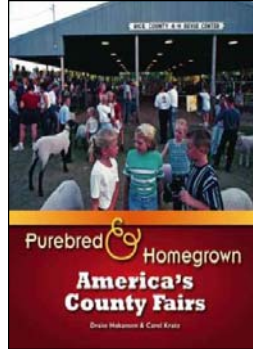
New Local History Books

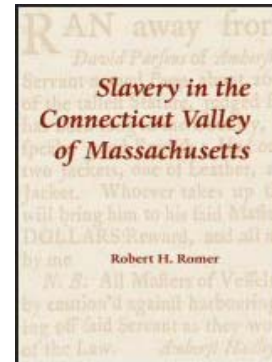

New Local History CD's & DVD's

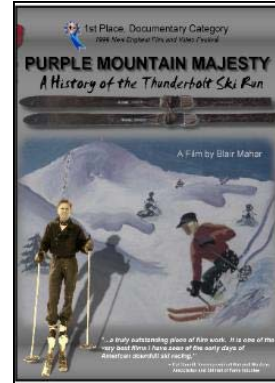
Panoramic Maps of the United States and Canada - This 3 cd set includes 19 th c. historical bird's eye maps of larger cities in New England and throughout the U.S. These colorful maps show how cities looked around the time of the industrial movement and westward expansion. Some Berkshire County towns included are North Adams, Adams, Pittsfield and Great Barrington.

1904 Atlas of Berkshire County by Farnham on cd-rom - We now have available on cd-rom this early atlas of Berkshire towns. This will help to protect our large print edition. The American Zylonite Company and Early Plastics in Adams

This once thriving manufacturer called the American Zylonite Company, was founded in 1881 Adams, Mass. During its brief existence it produced novelty items such as mirrors, collars, billiard balls, and other everyday items from **zylonite**, a predecessor to our modern day plastics. Included in the exhibit are original items made of **zylonite**, a panoramic map of Adams during the late 19th c. and views of the American Zylonite Company buildings then and now.



Frances Jones-Sneed and five of her senior seminar students have been working this spring semester on documenting the history of African Americans in North Adams, 1790-1930. Students have been using the federal census and city directories available in Freel Library. They will present their findings at the MCLA Undergraduate Research Conference on April 22. On Tuesday May 4th at 6 p.m., they will talk about their research at the North Adams Public Library. The presentation is free and open to the public. This is an event sponsored by MCLA History Dept., Freel Library, the North Adams Public Library and the North Adams Historical Society.

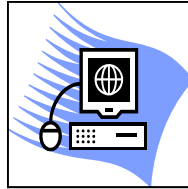

Local History News in Freel Library



The Reference Department now has a computer dedicated to local history research. The reference staff has been working on compiling finding aids for some of our local history and archival collections that have not been catalogued.

So far we have indexing for:

- Urban Renewal in North Adams (scrapbook collection of newspaper articles) -1966 -1977
- Local History vertical files by subject
- Hoosuck Community Resource Project/Newspaper Files -1972 -1978
- Railroad pamphlets relating to the construction of the Hoosac Tunnel
- College history timeline - 1894 to present
- African Americans in the Berkshires documentary project - indexing for our vertical files collection.

Over time we will continue to add other finding aids. We are currently in the process of indexing older clippings that pertain to the college in local newspapers. This computer will also be used to run several cd-roms , map programs, and other local history data that we have.
