Dave Cupery is a native of Holland, Michigan. After finishing a BA at Centre College (KY) he spent two years in Guayaquil, Ecuador as a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar, although his wife Karen - from Ecuador - claims he only headed to South America to find her. His PhD is from the University of Colorado Boulder and his primary research looks at Latin American public opinion and political rhetoric towards the US and China. Along with Latin American politics, Dave is interested in the politics of Sub-Saharan Africa, economic and political development, and civil conflict. He looks forward to teaching courses on these subjects and others at MCLA. When not in the classroom, Dave enjoys traveling, spending time in the outdoors, and playing soccer.

Amber Engelson is an assistant professor of English-Communications and MCLA's new Writing Across the Curriculum specialist. Her most recent faculty position was at the University of Denver.
